On Armistice Day — the eleventh hour on the eleventh day of the eleventh month, we pause.

We will remember them. The Armistice, an agreement to end the fighting of the First World War as a prelude to peace negotiations, began at that time on 11 November 1918. Communities around the world continue to mark the Armistice anniversary each year.

However, following the Second World War, it was agreed that the focus should be on all those who died in service of their country (not just the servicemen of the First World War). The day was subsequently renamed Remembrance Day, but its traditions were largely unchanged.

The anniversary's significance was reiterated in 1997, when Governor-General Sir William Deane issued a proc-

lamation urging Australians to "...observe, unless impracticable, one minute's silence at 11am on Remembrance Day each year to remember the sacrifice of those who died or otherwise suffered in Australia's cause in wars and war-like conflicts."

Many will recognise the blood-red poppy as a symbol of remembrance, particularly on Remembrance Day.

This tradition has its origins during the First World War inspired by the fields of poppies that grew in the battle-ravaged fields of the Western Front.

FOCUS OF WAR MEMORIAL 'SHOULD REMAIN ON A.D.F.'

The Australian War Memorial should be exclusively to honour Australian Defence Force personnel who have survived in wartime theatres of conflict including peacekeepers, the Returned Services League has said. That applies to all war memorials and cenotaphs around the country.

The RSL said it supported the establishment of memorials to mark those killed in frontier conflicts, but they should be separate from the Australian War Memorial and the Cenotaphs located around Australia.

RSL Australia President Greg Melick said the Australian War Memorial in Canberra and the Cenotaphs honoured all Australian Defence Force personnel, as well as peacekeepers who served our nation in wars and conflicts overseas.

"This includes First Nations' personnel who served in our armed forces with courage and honour, as well as servicemen and women of all backgrounds," he said.

"The frontier conflicts are an entirely different matter and are a significant part of our history that would be more appropriately told in the National Museum or a specific national memorial.

"While some frontier conflicts have been featured in Australian War Memorial galleries and touring exhibitions, these have been mounted to provide some context to the subsequent service of First Nations' people in the ADF.

"Surely, the soon to be established, and publicly funded Ngurra National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Cultural Precinct in the heart of Canberra, between Parliament House and the Australian War Memorial, could provide an opportunity for national recognition of the frontier conflicts.

"The Australian War Memorial honours the sacrifice of those who have served our nation in armed conflicts and peacekeeping operations, and it is right and appropriate that this is exclusively maintained."

Recently, War Memorial Council chair Dr Brendan Nelson said: "The council has made the decision that we will have a much broader, much deeper depiction and presentation of the violence committed against Aboriginal people, initially by British, then by pastoralists, then by police and by Aboriginal militia."

As The Australian reported, "But to many on both sides of this debate, Nelson's words were interpreted as a fundamental shift in the role of the War Memorial and an official recognition that frontier conflicts were a central part of Australia's war history."

Mr Melick says the portrayal of frontier wars within the Memorial should be a limited one because other institutions should be telling that story.

BUDGET:

DVA to address claims backlog

The recent Commonwealth Budget included some increases for Department of Veterans Affairs including 500 new frontline staff to address the compensation claims backlog and deliver faster decisions for veterans and families.

However, there has been no action to address the anomaly between the funeral benefits for older and younger veterans, that is, those covered by the previous Veterans Entitlement Act such as Vietnam veterans, and later legislation.

Apparently, the commitment made by Labor in 2019 to address the issue has not been continued, given that the later Coalition government did not either.

The VEA entitlement is a maximum \$2000 and under the later Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 2004 it is up to \$13,000; but both have varying bereavement entitlements

The Australian Government is investing \$537.5 million to DVA in the 2022-23 October Budget. In 2022-23, \$11.5 billion will be allocated to the veteran support system.

The additional staff to handle claims is one of several measures in response to the Interim Report from the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide.

Other budget measures include:

Modernising DVA's IT systems and improve the administration of the claims processing system and veterans' services;

Further support for the health and wellbeing of veterans and families, including establishing 10 more Veterans' and Families' Hubs;

A new Veteran Employment Program;

An increase to the Totally and Permanently Incapacitated (TPI) Payment to support around 27,000 of our most vulnerable veterans.

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

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November Timeline — Diem to Holden

2 November 1963: Ngô Đình Diệm, South Vietnam's first President (1955–63), and his brother, Ngô Đình Nhu, are assassinated in a successful CIA-backed coup d'état led by General Dương Văn Minh of the Army of the Republic of Vietnam (ARVN).

4 November 1930: Phar Lap won the Melbourne Cup, winning 37 races from 51 starts, becoming a legend of Australian sporting history. His sensational rise from humble beginnings captured the public's imagination during the difficult years of the 1930s Great Depression. His death in the United States in 1932 prompted an outpouring of anger and grief.

8 November 1965: 1RAR fights one of the first set-piece


engagements of the war between Australian forces and the Viet Cong at the Battle of Gang Toi. Two servicemen, Private Richard Parker and Private Peter Gillson, are posted missing believed killed during the fighting. Their bodies are recovered more than 40 years later, and returned to Australia for burial.

10 November 1964: Selective conscription is introduced for 20-year-old males by ballot under the National Service Act (1964). Between 1964 and 1972, around 804,000 men registered for national service, of whom more than 63,000 were called up to serve in the Army where many were integrated into regular units that served in Vietnam. The Australian Government announced the withdrawal of troops from Vietnam in 1971, followed by the termination of the scheme in December 1972.

11 November 1918: At 5am, in Marshal Foch's railway car in the Forest of Compiègne, the Armistice between the Allied and Central Powers was signed, silencing the guns of World War I effective at 11am – the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

11 November 1975: After a series of dramatic events including a 1974 double dissolution and a budgetary supply crisis, the Gough Whitlam-led federal Labor government became the first (and only) government in Australian history to be dismissed by the Governor-General.

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

12 November 1894: Lawrence Hargrave, Australian inventor, astronomer, explorer and historian, connected four box kites of his own design. Having added a seat, he flew with the kites 16 feet (4.8 metres) off the ground, thus proving to the world that it was possible to build a safe, heavier-than-air flying machine.

13 November 1942: Five Sullivan Brothers from Waterloo, Iowa, were lost in the sinking of the cruiser USS Juneau by a Japanese torpedo off Guadalcanal during World War II in the Pacific. Following their deaths, the US Navy changed regulations to prohibit close relatives from serving on the same ship.

13 November 1965: Warrant Officer Class Two Kevin Arthur Wheatley dies while defending a wounded comrade. He is posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross for his gallantry.

16 November 1920: W. Hudson Fysh, Paul McGinness



and Fergus McMaster established the Queensland and Northern Territory Aerial Services Ltd with two open-cabin biplanes. Today Qantas is the second oldest airline in the world and the company and its flying kangaroo livery are Australian icons.

22 November 1963: Lyndon B. Johnson becomes US president after the assassination of John F. Kennedy. Johnson announces that the US will continue support of South Vietnam. By the end of 1963, 15,000 US advisors are serving in Vietnam; the US gives \$500m in aid to Vietnam that year.

29 November 1948: Launch of Australia's first locally made mass-production car was a milestone in Australian manufacturing. The FX (pictured) was an immediate success. The Holden transformed suburban Australia, boosted national pride and quickly become a national icon.

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Sapper rewarded for years in fire service

MEMBER Mal Overend finished his National Service as a Sapper after a tour of duty in Vietnam, and a few years later he became a Captain with the Queensland Fire and Rescue Authority.

In 1999, as Fire Services Chief (**right**) he was rewarded for 30 years voluntary service with the authority in his hometown of Oakey west of Toowoomba – and home of Army Aviation.

Mal's father served in the RAAF in World War Two and discharged at Oakey, where he stayed and set up a painting and signwriting business. Mal finished a five-year apprenticeship with him before being called up as a 20-year-old.

He served with 17 Construction Squadron in Vietnam from September 1969 to August 1970 (**below right**).

He and wife Kaye took over his father's business in 1986. They have had some tough times along the way – Mal's sister died just before he went to Vietnam and they lost a son at the age of 31.


They also have a daughter who has given them three grandchildren.

Mal is a keen lawn bowler, but has been busy the last few weeks, coming out of retirement to refurbish the Drop-In Centre sign that overlooks his bowls club.



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As we approach Armistice Day, or as it is now called, Remembrance Day, we sadly acknowledge that all troops and nurses who served in the 1914 to 1918 war, termed 'The Great War, World War 1 or 'The War to End All Wars' are no longer with us.

I have the honour of yet again officiating at the Caloundra RSL to remember those who paid the supreme sacrifice; as well as those who came home broken in body and spirit, suffering from what we now call PTSD, but in those days, 'Shell Shock'.

On Remembrance Day we will remember those who without the modern communications we have today of iPhones, iPads, and much faster mail services, lived lonely lives in the trenches and waited for letters from home to hear of the two-month stale news.

Dysentery and scurvy were rife among the troops on the battlefield, further irritated by the heavy material in their uniforms, the irregular availability of showers, unpalatable rations and lack of fresh meat and vegetables.

Rupert Murdoch had visited the troops in the field and reported their appalling conditions to Lloyd George who promised to pass the plight of the Australian soldier in the battlefield on to Australia's Prime Minister, the Hon. Billy Hughes.

No matter how we polish up the stories of our men in battle, they lived in atrocious conditions.

But out of that terrible situation sprang a new type of English language.



Something that did not work as it should, became a 'dud,' not hitherto given that title before the Great War.

And then there was the exaggerated story which became known as 'a furphy.' Most of you know how that word came into being but allow me to tell you.

Fireside with the Padre



John Furphy built a foundry in Kyneton in Victoria, before increasing his business to Shepparton. There the foundry built water carts for Australian farmers.

Furphy water carts first appeared in the Broadmeadows Army Barracks as Australian troops gathered and trained there prior to embarkation overseas to assist the British in their war effort.

Once on the battle fields of Europe, the Furphy water carts provided fresh water to quench the thirst of war weary 'Diggers'. Soldiers collected their mail from home around the Furphy water carts. It became a place to while away their rest breaks, with a cup of water and a cigarette. It was a place to relate their yarns, both of home and of the battlefield. The stories became more exaggerated as time passed by and far exceeded the original telling of the yarn.

The plate on the rear of the water cart, (see photo of same from my Commanding Officer in Hong Kong) became collector's items.

I trust all our members will attend a Remembrance Day service somewhere along the Coast and share your yarns that were told at the rear of the Furphy water carts.

Sappers get together


