End of Vietnam War to be marked in 2023

A range of significant events around the country is being planned to commemorate next year's 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War.

The Australian Government has committed \$6 million towards the milestone marking formal declaration Australia's involvement was at an end when the Governor-General issued a proclamation on 11 January 1973.

The last combat troops came home in March 1972 apart from a platoon guarding the Australian Embassy, which left in June 1973. However, the RAAF sent aircraft back to Vietnam in 1975 to help with evacuations, the last flying out on Anzac Day that year.

"Australia owes our Vietnam veterans an enormous debt of gratitude," Minister for Veterans' Affairs and Defence Personnel, Andrew Gee Minister Gee said. "We honour and remember the service and sacrifice of each and every one of them."

"At places like Long Tan, Nui Lei, Binh Ba, Coral and Balmoral, Ap My An and many others, Australians served with distinction, in the finest traditions of our armed forces."

"Our country should be very proud

of all they achieved.

"Commemorating the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam conflict will be an important opportunity for Australians to express the pride, gratitude and respect of the nation."

"The Vietnam War and its aftermath exacted a heavy toll on all those who served and their families. The treatment of our Diggers upon their return home by some of their fellow Australians remains a source of hurt and pain for many."

"The 50-year commemoration is

another important step in helping to heal the wounds that were inflicted back in Australia."

"I will be working closely with the Vietnam veteran community to ensure ... events that honour all Australians who served in the Vietnam conflict."

"The centrepiece will be a national commemorative service at the Australian Vietnam Forces National Memorial on Anzac Parade in Canberra."

Further announcements on the details of specific commemorations and the consultation process will be made on the DVA website in due course.

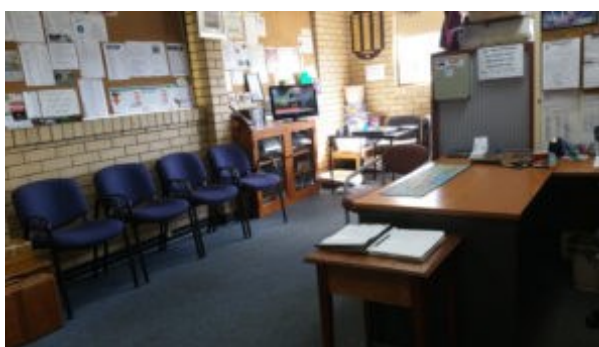

A new Army Aviation Command was established late last year within the Australian Army and the Australian Defence Force.

“The alignment of Army’s aviation capability under its own command optimises Army Aviation to better support land, amphibious and special operations,” Chief of Army Lieutenant General Burr said.

He announced the establishment of the new command at a ceremonial parade and helicopter flyover at Blamey Square, Canberra.

“The command will improve resilience and adaptability and ensure Army’s training system is agile and contemporary.

“The unity, sense of purpose and focus in a single command will support our land forces to achieve more tasks, in more difficult environments.

“The command also represents the delivery of another key milestone set out in the 2020 Defence Strategic Update and 2020 Force Structure Plan.”

Commanded by Major General Stephen Jobson, Aviation Command will deliver aviation capability to support Army’s land power to enable the Joint Force.

“Aviation Command will coordinate the introduction into service of new helicopters and unmanned aerial systems, and enhance and assure the safety, effectiveness and sustainability of current aircraft,” he said.

“The changes to Army’s aviation command and control structure will simplify the management of Army’s helicopters — one of the most multifaceted and resource-intensive platforms used by the land forces.”

It means that 16th Aviation Brigade and the Army Aviation Training Centre will transfer from Army Forces Command to Aviation Command.

Army’s aviation capability provides aviation recon-

naissance, firepower support, air assault, and battlefield support and surveillance, in combined, joint and inter-agency environments.

Army operates various types of aircraft including the Boeing CH-47F Chinook, Eurocopter Tiger armed reconnaissance helicopter, NH Industries MRH90 Taipan multi-role helicopter and civil light utility helicopters.

Digger dies in flood

A 73-year-old man whose body was retrieved from floodwaters in Yalangur near Toowoomba in early December was a former president of the Roma Returned Services League and Vietnam veteran Robert Menz.

Long-time friend Glyn “Dogga” Dare said he met Mr Menz in the early ‘90s when they had shearing contracts in Birdsville, Bedourie, Innaminka and Thargomindah, it was reported in *The Courier-Mail*.

Mr Dare said he would often go fishing and used to have a drink with Mr Menz, his “great little mate” at the local pub in Thargomindah after work.

Robert Menz (2793245) was born on 5 November 1948 at Wagga Wagga and served with 2 RAR in Vietnam in 1970-71.

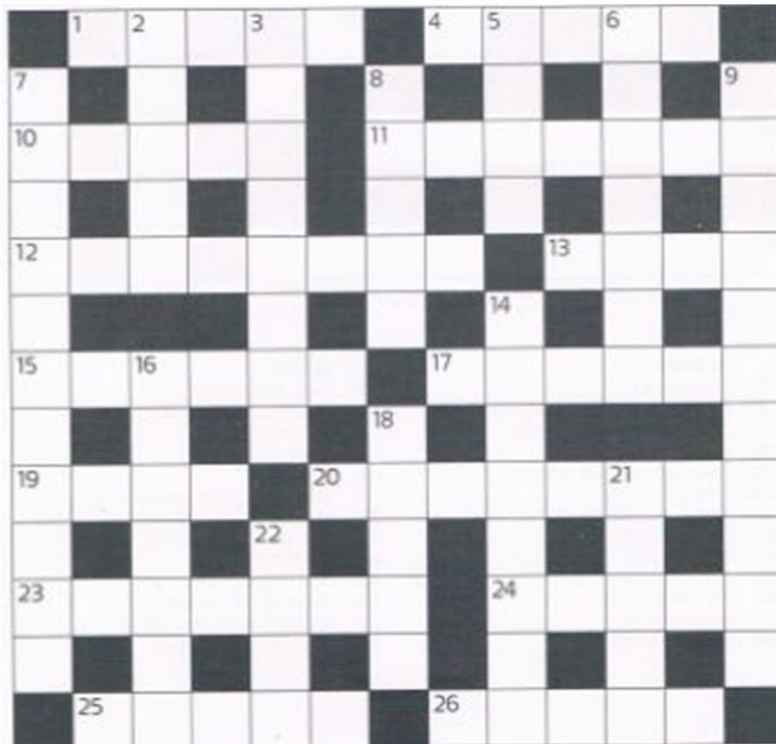

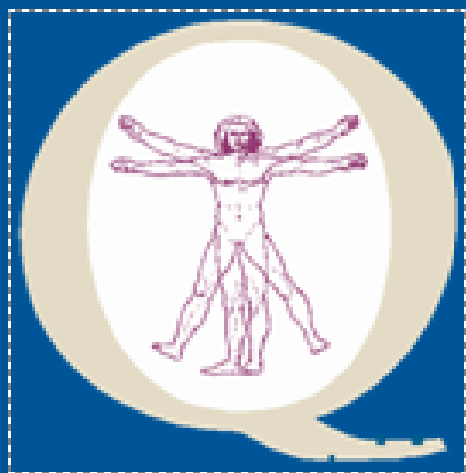

Aussie victory in their first battle of WW2

On January 3, 1941, Australian troops fought in their first battle of World War Two at Bardia in Libya.

It involved the 16th Brigade of the 6th Australian Division and later the 17th Australian Brigade.

The attack cost the Australian forces 130 killed and 326 wounded but the enemy 1703 killed, 3740 wounded and nearly 40,000 Italians taken prisoner.

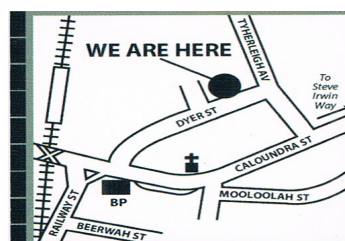
The town was occupied by the Axis forces for the third and last time in June 1942 and abandoned without a fight following their defeat at El Alamein in November 1942.

Bardia is a small town on the Mediterranean coast of Libya, in the region of Cyrenaica, approximately 30 kilometres from the Egyptian border. During the early decades of the 20th century it was developed as a military outpost during Italy's colonisation of the region.

February Timeline — from Ba Ria to Breaker Morant

1 February 1968: A major Viet Cong attack in the Battle of Ba Ria in the main Australian area of operation in the Vietnam War is defeated with heavy casualties inflicted.

1 February 1984: The Medicare system was introduced, establishing basic health care for all Australians.

3 February 1966: At Pentridge Jail in Melbourne Ronald Ryan became the last person hanged in Australia. He was convicted of murdering a prison guard while escaping from jail.

6 February 1851: On 'Black Thursday' European settlers in Victoria faced their first catastrophic bushfires, which burnt a quarter of the colony. In the previous winter, the Europeans saw snow for the first time in Melbourne, followed by deluges and floods. On 7 February 2009, 173 people were killed in bushfires, again in Victoria.

February 6 1952: King George VI (pictured) of England died. Upon his death, his daughter Princess Elizabeth became Queen Elizabeth II, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland. Her actual coronation took place on June 2, 1953.

6 February 1968: An Australian businessman, Charles Keith Hyland, is captured by the Viet Cong, being one of few Australian civilians held captive during the war. He was released on 25 November, 1968.

12 February 1851: The fires did not stop the search for gold with the first discoveries of payable gold at Ophir in New South Wales on this date and later at Ballarat and Bendigo Creek in Victoria. This started a series of rushes that transformed the Australian colonies.

14 February 1966: On Valentine's Day Australians woke to a brand-new currency. The decision to change from the Australian pound (with its awkward shillings and pence) to a decimal currency – the Australian dollar – had been a pragmatic, economic one. Yet decimalisation became an opportunity for Australia to assert itself as an increasingly self-assured and forward-thinking country.

15 February 1942: Singapore fell to the Japanese and, with one million citizens trapped in the city and water supplies at critical levels, British commander Lieutenant General Arthur Percival surrendered. More than 130,000 Allied troops were taken prisoner.

15 February 1989: Soviet Russia completed its military withdrawal from Afghanistan after nine years of unsuccessful involvement in the civil war between

Muslim rebel groups and the Russian-backed Afghan government. Over 15,000 Russian soldiers had been killed in the fighting.

21 February 1907: The first surf lifesaving club was founded at Bondi in February 1907 and several others were established soon after. Surf lifesaving clubs soon spread around the country and the surf lifesavers themselves became an Australian icon.

23–24 February 1966: 1 RAR is involved in the Battle of Suoi Bong Trang, while providing protection to US engineers building a tactically important road in Bình Dương Province.

27 February 1902: Just before the end of the Boer War, lieutenants Harry 'Breaker' Morant (pictured) and Peter Handcock were executed by firing squad for murdering 12 Boer prisoners of war. The controversy surrounding their trial and execution led to Morant becoming a folk hero.

Sleepbus for our homeless

Maroochydore Neighbourhood Centre has taken delivery of its Blue Sleepbus (pictured) for homeless men after a successful campaign launched in May 2020 to raise \$100,000.

The funding has paid for the installation of safe modern sleeping quarters in a second-hand bus donated by CDC (formerly Buslink).

Strong community support and significant large donations from local philanthropists ensured the target for the Sleepbus was reached in 12 months.

In June 2021 another \$100,000 was raised in a matter of three weeks to fund another — Pink Sleepbus — for homeless women and children, with fit-out underway. It is scheduled for delivery mid-year.

ASK YOUR ACTIVOT OT

WOULD YOU BENEFIT FROM AN ELECTRIC SCOOTER OR ELECTRIC WHEELCHAIR?

If you have a condition that impacts your mobility you may be eligible for an electric wheelchair or electric scooter through the DVA RAP program. To be eligible you must have the following:

VETERAN GOLD CARD: Gold Card holders with a clinically assessed need that is due to a condition that affects mobility.

VETERAN WHITE CARD: White Card holders with a clinically assessed need arising from a war-caused or service-related injury/disease/condition covered for under the Treatment Principles.

The application for an electric scooter or wheelchair involves a comprehensive process and may take some time as it requires prior approval from DVA. To start the application process, talk to your general practitioner (GP) or medical specialist first as they will need to complete a medical questionnaire.

Once you have medical clearance your ActivOT OT can complete the next steps. Your OT will visit you in

your home environment and assist you to work out what item will best suit your needs and make sure you have somewhere safe and secure to store it and charge it. Once approved your OT will arrange a trial of suitable electric scooters or wheelchairs to take place at your home. Then once it is delivered your OT will continue to work with you to ensure you can safely operate the scooter or wheelchair.

We are happy to assist you in accessing eligible products and services you are entitled to through the DVA RAP program. It is always our aim to work with you to help keep you living safely and independently in your home for as long as possible.

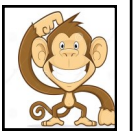
