



## REMEMBRANCE FOR YOUNG AND OLD

REMEMBRANCE Day means many different things to different people whether you are a veteran thinking of a mate who didn't make it, or had a grandfather who served in World War One, or whether your heroism, serving with mates in a recent war, was recognised.

Like Victoria Cross recipient Daniel Keighran (pictured below), who said Remembrance Day was an opportunity to reflect with his grandfather who fought in World War II and served as a father figure for him.

"A number of family members had served previously, and without a doubt without my grandfather's guidance and commitment to ensure that I turned out to be a good young man – who knows where I would have ended up," he says.

"We used to reflect on his service, what he'd been through. Now, I remember those special, special moments with him certainly."

The decorated army corporal, who spent his early years in Nambour and later in central Queensland said he didn't grow up with much. Aged 17 he felt he had three options: grow dope, continue school, or join the Army, he told RSL News.

So began his long journey to becoming one of only four soldiers in Afghanistan to receive the Victoria Cross for Australia after he deliberately drew ene-

my fire on to himself in 2010.

"It's about understanding the sacrifices that have been made for the freedoms that we so readily enjoy today," he said of Remembrance Day.

In 2012, Corporal Daniel 'Dan' Keighran was awarded the Victoria Cross for Australia – the highest award in the Australian honours system – for his actions in the Battle of Derapet in Afghanistan in 2010.

He was only the third soldier, and the first member of the Royal Australian Regiment (RAR), to receive the Victoria Cross for Australia since the award's introduction in 1991.

"For me, military service was a way out of where I was at that point in my life." Dan was deployed on multiple operations.

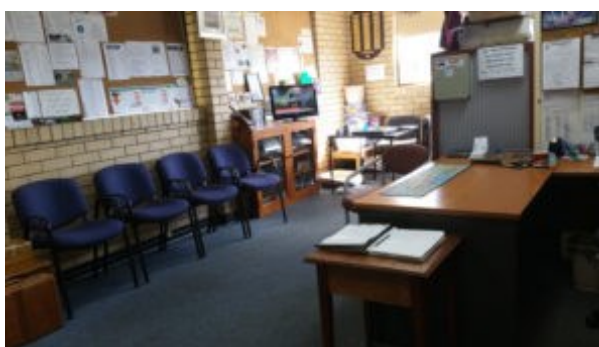

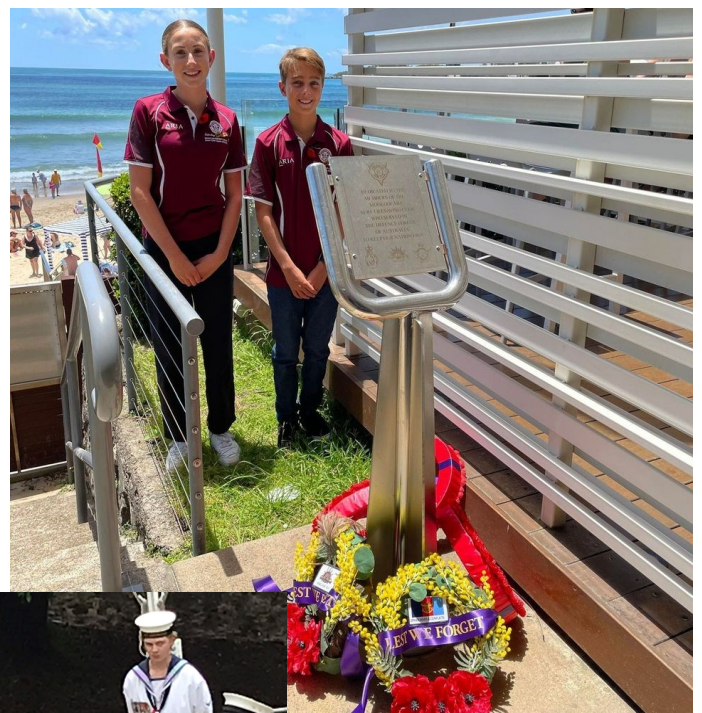

## YOUNG MEN FROM LOCAL FAMILY REMEMBERED

Local men and women from the Sunshine Coast were among those remembered at services on 11 November, Remembrance Day.

“The people of our region grieved for the loss of many fine young Australians during the Great War,” *Ricochet* editor Kerry White said in an address to a luncheon at Mooloolaba Surf Club.

“Several of those young men came from the same family – the Scottish-born Gilvear family of Glass House Mountains.

“Before war was declared, Thomas Gilvear ran a banana farm with his wife Christina and six older sons. In May 1916, he signed up at the age of 43 with six of his sons and they went on to fight at the front.

“Christina cared for the remaining four children and managed the farm. The depth of sorrow felt by Christina

as she received telegrams with the news that three of her sons had been killed on the battlefields of France no doubt stayed with her for the remainder of her life,” he said, recounting information from the Sunshine Coast Regional Council website on heritage.

“Let us remember all who have served Australia in conflicts. The Australian War Memorial has a long list of conflicts in which Australians have been involved including of course two World Wars, the First in which we lost 61,665 and the Second 39,656.

“There are 32 in total also including the South African Boer War (592), Korea (340), Vietnam (523) and Afghanistan (45). Our total military losses in wars have been 103 thousand and 10.”

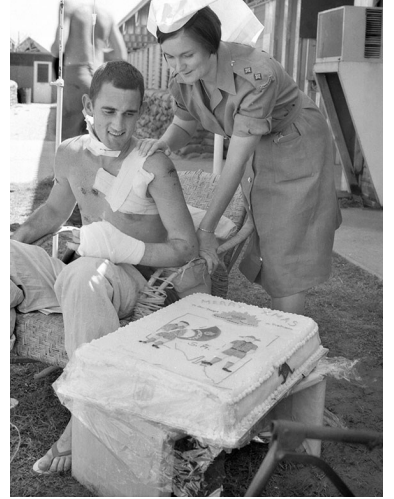

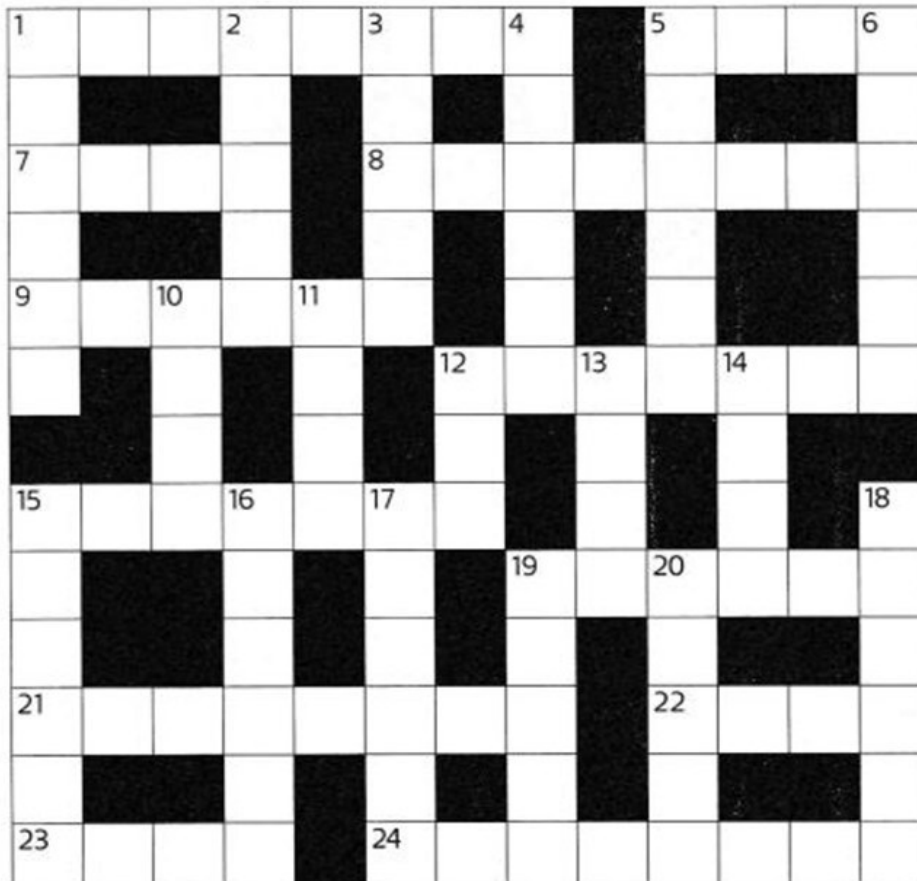

paying the bill, you can turn off the service, right?"

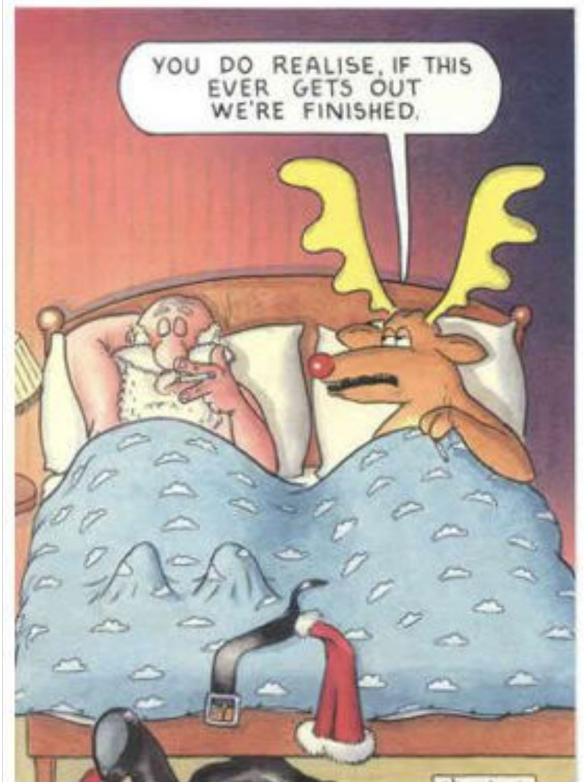
"Well, yes," she said reluctantly. "But that would ruin his credit."

## December/January Timeline

**2 December 1911:** Douglas Mawson led the ill-fated Australasian Antarctic Expedition (AAE) which sailed from Hobart for Antarctica in the Aurora with a view to returning in early 1913. Mawson lost three colleagues, Belgrave Edward Ninnis and Xavier Mertz.

**3 December 1854:** Early on the morning of Sunday 3 December 1854, government troops attacked the Eureka Stockade. At least 22 diggers and six soldiers were killed. Miners who were disgruntled with the way the colonial government had been administering the goldfields, had built the stockade.

**7 December 7:** The US Naval base at Pearl Harbor was attacked by nearly 200 Japanese aircraft in a raid that lasted just over one hour and left nearly 3000 Americans dead.

**9 December 1971:** 4 RAR, the last Australian infantry battalion in South Vietnam, sails for Australia on board *HMAS Sydney*.

**12 December 1959:** At the US Grand Prix Jack Brabham became the first Australian to win a Formula One World Championship. He won again in 1960 and 1966.

**18 December 1964:** In response to requests from the US president and South Vietnam prime minister for another 200 advisers, the Australian Government offers to send ground troops to South Vietnam.


**25 December 1974:** Cyclone Tracy hit Darwin in the small hours of Christmas Day 1974, killing 71 people and devastated 80 per cent of the city. In the days and weeks following the disaster, most of the traumatised population left the city.

**26 December 1906:** *The Story of the Kelly Gang* opened at the Athenaeum Theatre in Melbourne. It was the first multi-reel, feature-length film ever produced in the world.

**26 December 2004:** An estimated 230,000 people were killed and 1.5 million left homeless when a magnitude 9.3 earthquake on the seafloor of the Indian Ocean set off tsunamis that smashed into a dozen countries.

**29 December 1928:** Don Bradman scored his first international test century. It was against England at the Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG) in the third test of the 1928–29 Ashes series.

## December/January Timeline

**1 January 1901:** Australia became a nation when the British Parliament passed legislation enabling the six Australian colonies to govern in their own right as the Commonwealth of Australia (**Federation Day 1901 below**).

**9 January 1868:** The convict transport *Hougoumont* arrived at the port of Fremantle with 269 convicts, the last to be sent to Western Australia. It was also the end of 80 years of continuous penal transportation to the Australian continent.

**10 January 1920:** The League of Nations officially came into existence with the goal of resolving international disputes,

reducing armaments, and preventing future wars.

**19 January 1900:** The first case of bubonic plague in Australia was reported in January 1900. Bubonic plague is one of the deadliest diseases humanity has ever faced.

**22 January 1931:** Sir Isaac Alfred Isaacs became our first Australian-born governor-general. He proved that a 'local man' could hold the office as competently as the British aristocrats who had preceded him.

**26 January 1938:** The first Aboriginal Day of Mourning – the Indigenous response to Australia's sesquicentenary in 1938 – was commemorated in Sydney. It was the first national gathering of Indigenous people.

**28 January 1986:** The US Space Shuttle Challenger exploded 74 seconds into its flight, killing seven, including Christa McAuliffe, a teacher who was to be the first ordinary citizen in space.

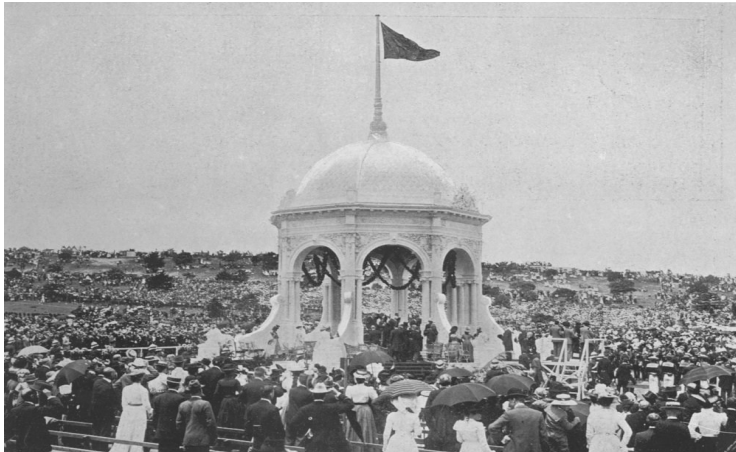
**30 January 1968:** Tet Offensive is launched. It was a major escalation and one of the largest military campaigns of the Vietnam War. It was a campaign of surprise attacks against military and civilian command and control centres throughout South Vietnam.

## CEREMONY FOR 80th ANNIVERSARY OF HEROIC KOKODA CAMPAIGN

The 80th anniversary of the historic Kokoda campaign was marked recently with ceremonies in Australia and Papua New Guinea.

At Kokoda Village in Oro Province inland from Port Moresby, a flag was raised to mark a similar event 80 years ago during the Kokoda campaign.

Aussie Diggers including many from the Sunshine Coast fought in mud and dense jungle in one of the most grueling World War Two actions.

Maroochy RSL Board president and Vietnam veteran Len Thompson was at the Kokoda Village Memorial ceremony alongside Australian and PNG representatives and members of the Kokoda Memorial Foundation.

"It was a very moving ceremony," Len said. "The local school children attended and stood for a very long time in the heat before they very sweetly sang the National anthems of both Australia and Papua New Guinea."

"It was amazing to see so many people paying their respect including descendants of the 'Fuzzy Wuzzy Angels' and World War Two Diggers who pushed back the enemy and reraised the Australian flag on this very site on November 3 1942".

The group of volunteers of the foundation regularly visit the Kokoda track assisting in many projects including clean water infrastructure and building war memorials. Al-

so attending with a crowd of 600 including 200 schoolchildren, were the Australian Assistant Minister for Defence and Assistant Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Matt Thislewaite, and the NSW Minister for Transport, Veterans and Western Sydney, David Elliot.

Mr Elliot officially launched a digital honour roll, which is now a permanent fixture at the Education Centre. The roll is projected onto the windows of the Education Centre and features the names of more than 600 Australians killed during the campaign.
